On Track to Resume Full Day Schedule on March 1

We remain on track to resume our full day schedule on Monday, March 1. This week's NJ COVID activity level report linked below shows continuing decrease statewide, and just like last week the lowest activity level among all NJ regions is in our Southwest region. Weather conditions that enable eating outside remain an important consideration.

Budget Update

Our preliminary 2021-22 budget presentation will take place at our Board meeting this coming Thursday, February 25. This morning, the superintendents of the Lenape Region districts whose state funding is being reduced (Evesham among them as our funding is being reduced most of all) met with Assemblywoman Jean Stanfield and Assemblyman Ryan Peters for a discussion of the costs of education during COVID, especially for districts like ours and all Lenape Region districts that have provided in-person learning since September. We spoke of the importance of accelerating vaccinations for our staff and of the biggest obstacle to getting more students back in school, which is the CDC's 6 foot distancing guideline. Further steps are ensuing from this conversation. I am very thankful to Assemblywoman Stanfield and Assemblyman Peters for their time and support of our district's work and needs.

Regarding Students Returning to Five Full Days a Week of In-Person Learning

This goal should be the most important federal and state goal, supported by additional resources such as increased funding and access to vaccinations for school staff, especially since it is not achievable based on current CDC guidance. I am grateful to our staff for all they are doing to support all our students, in-person and remote, to foster growth and mitigate loss, during these times. The new CDC guidance (Operational Strategy for K-12 Schools through Phased Mitigation)



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released last week is aimed at helping the thousands of districts reopen nationwide that have been closed since last March, and does not provide relief from or alternatives to the CDC's 6 feet social distancing guideline followed by the Department of Education and Department of Health. Our district has been following CDC guidance all year and is working to help more students come in, classroom by classroom, seat by seat, dependent on variables like room size and the number of remote students in a given class. Every district exists in order to safely serve students--first, last, foremost.

Black History Month Opportunity

Next Friday, February 26 at 12 pm, an engaging Black History Month presentation will take place featuring members of the Still Family--one of New Jersey's most prominent Black families--speaking with Congressman Andy Kim on the legacy of brothers William Still, abolitionist and "Father of the Underground Railroad," and Dr. James Still, known as the "Black Doctor of the Pines," whose historic office still stands in Medford, NJ, a mere seven miles from our administration building. This program is a partnership between the Office of Congressman Kim, the New Jersey Amistad Commission, the Dr. James Still Education Center, and Jacob's Chapel AME Church.
